Robyn Tingley is the founder of GlassSKY Inc., a social enterprise focused on diversity and leadership. She trains audiences around the world and helps companies implement diversity initiatives, specializing in programs for women and Millennials, the two fastest-growing groups in the workforce. She is the vice-chair of the Board of Governors of the University of New Brunswick, and a founding member of Women for 50%, an initiative focused on greater female representation in politics. Her new book, 10 Essentials for the Motivated Millen-

nial, and her career advice have received praise from global senior executives and are featured in Dow Jones, Oxford Business News, Fast Company, CBS, and Monster.com. MOTIVATIONAL SPEAKER MARK BLACK

Born with a life-threatening heart defect, Mark underwent two openheart surgeries before the age of one. His parents were told to expect more surgeries before he started school. Mark was not expected to live a long life. He battled his condition and it's limitations successfully for twenty-two years before having to face the biggest challenge of his life. Mark's doctor informed him that his heart was failing badly and that without a rare and dangerous heart and double-lung transplant, he would not likely see his 25th birthday. In October 2001, Mark moved thousands of kilometres from home and was put on the transplant waiting list. After just four months on the list, Mark's con-

dition grew worse and he was placed in the hospital where he lived on the precipice of life and death, for 6 months.

Finally, by the grace of God, on September 7th, 2002, Mark received a second chance at life: a life-saving Heart & Double-Lung Transplant. Since receiving his second chance at life Mark hasn't wasted a moment. After meeting the love of his life, Marise, the two married, and they have 3 healthy children. Mark has travelled the globe speaking to more than 150,000 people.

Mark lives in Moncton, New Brunswick where he spends as much time as possible with the most important people in his life; his wife Marise and their three children Emma, Matteo, and Caleb.

TransAqua - Greater Moncton Wastewater Commission Wastewater Treatment Facility

The TransAqua Vision is "To be an outstanding environmental steward supporting regional planning, economic development and quality of life for the communities of Dieppe, Moncton and Riverview."



Moncton Water Treatment Facility with Tower Road Dam

The state-of-the-art, class IV facility is capable of producing 25 million gallons of water per day. In 2014, the City of Moncton commissioned the development and construction of a second reservoir within the Protected Turtle Creek Watershed known as the Tower Road Dam Reservoir.

WORKSHOPS

Tuesday, April 16th

9:30 - 10:30 AM: Choose Workshop A, B, or C

Workshop A: *Municipal Chlorine Measurement and Control.* The municipal potable water production and waste water treatment requires precise and reliable chlorine measurement to insure clean and safe drinking water. During this presentation we will focus on available technologies to measure chlorine online and discuss control and metering strategies.

Presenter: Marc Szuszkiewiez, ProMinent Fluid Controls Ltd.

Workshop B: Stormwater Management: Underground SS treatment unit using hydrodynamic separation and filtration. Hydrodynamic separation is one of the proven solutions for the management of SS present in runoff waters. The basic concept, as well as the general operation of a SS processing unit, will be presented to allow the participants to identify the various parameters in the system. Presenter: Phillipe Losier, Soleno Inc.

Workshop C: Ammonia Limits and Lagoons: Atlantic Canada's Options for Beating Effluent Limits. With a focus on the lagoon-based wastewater treatment plant in Doaktown, New Brunswick, this presentation digs into the factors that limit lagoon-based nitrification, discusses the merits and challenges of mechanical plants, and introduces the SAGR post-lagoon nitrification option—which has been shown to consistently reduce ammonia to <1 mg/L in <1°C water. Presenter: Francis Bordeleau, Nexom

Workshop D: *Do Not Consume - Is Your Utility Prepared.* In August 2017, a small algae bloom suddenly appeared near the spillway of Tower Road Dam. What if the Tri-Community was issued a Do Not Consume order by the Department of Health? With no plan in place for such an event, a team of staff from Operations, Emergency Measures, Communications, GIS, Finance, IT and Health officials was put together to prepare a Do Not Consume Plan for the Tri-Community. Presenter: Julie Stokes, City of Moncton

Workshop E: Bio-electrochemical sensor for wastewater quality monitoring at the Charlottetown Municipal wastewater treatment plant. Real-time insights on events and fluctuations in organic loading. Bio-electrochemical systems (BES) are an emerging technology with many proposed applications in the wastewater treatment industry.

Presenter: Mike Deighan, Island Water Technologies

Workshop F (French): *Upgrading Obsolete Technology and its Impact on the Water and Waste Water Industry.* This session will explore questions including: How to properly approach the challenges involved with upgrading older facilities? What are the risks faced when retrofitting older equipment? What are the risks faced by not upgrading and keeping un-supported or obsolete hardware in the facility? Presenter: Andre Dupuis, Amiko Control Systems

WORKSHOPS *cont...* Wednesday, April 17th 8:30 - 9:30 AM - Choose workshop G, H, or I

Workshop G: Wastewater Level Measurement with Primary Focus on Lift Stations, Wet Wells and Sumps. Level measurement is an important aspect of monitoring and controlling today's wastewater systems, whether it be level reading and pump control in lift stations, wet wells, and sumps, or measurement of clarifiers, anerobic digesters and chemical tanks. As regulations become more stringent we strive for ways to measure level accurately and safely in both the municipal and industrial sphere. Presenter: Matthew Clarke, Omnitech

Workshop H: *Stratford, PEI Water Meter Project.* In 2018 The Town of Stratford launched a project to install water meters to each customer in its water system. This session is ideal for those who would like to gain a better understanding of the factors that contributed to the success of Stratford's water metering program. Presenter: Ben Van Mierlo, Neptune Technology Group

Workshop I: *Water Loss Reduction Through Pressure Management*. Water loss, also known as non-revenue water (NRW), is a significant problem worldwide in potable water distribution systems. It is common knowledge that a good pressure management approach is one of many solutions to reducing water loss but it is typically the most economical approach with immediate results. Presenter: Jody Malo, Omnitech

10:00 - 11:00 AM - Choose workshop J, K, or L

Workshop J: Male-specific coliphage (MSC) as a viral indicator of water quality and treatment efficacy. MSC's can be used as a viral indicator for fecal contamination monitoring in water. In this presentation, work will be discussed wherein MSC's were used to monitor treatment efficacy in human wastewater treatment plants, as well as a surrogate to challenge and quantify the disinfection efficacy of wastewater treatment systems. Presenter: Dr. Benjamin Forward, Food Fisheries & Aquaculture Dept., New Brunswick Research & Productivity Council (RPC).

Workshop K: How to properly select VFDs for Deep Well Submersible Pumps. Selecting the best method to control a Deep Well Submersible Pump is often hard to determine based on the different available options and manufacturers. The industry trend is to install VFDs, however selection doesn't stop there, and variances in products and installations can make for a challenging selection. This session will help you understand the Do's and Don'ts when selecting a VFD to be used on a Deep Well Submersible Pump. Presenter: Dave Galbraith, Sansom Equipment Ltd.

Workshop L: Upcoming Health Canada Water Quality Guideline Changes: Aluminum, Copper and Strontium. This session will review Health Canada's rationale for proposing health-based maximum acceptable concentrations for aluminum, copper and strontium in drinking water. More specifically, this session will provide an overview of the key messages in the accompanying Health Canada technical documents including the rationale for the guideline change, exposure pathways and health impacts and recommended monitoring. Presenter: Krysta Montreuil, Nova Scotia Environment
