KEYNOTE SPEAKER DR KEVIN KELLOWAY



E. Kevin Kelloway is the Canada Research Chair in Occupational Health Psychology and Professor of Psychology at Saint Mary's University, Halifax, Nova Scotia. He received his Ph.D. in Organizational Psychology from Queen's University in 1991 and began his career in the Department of Psychology at the University of Guelph.

In 1999 he joined the Faculty of Commerce at Saint Mary's University as Professor of Management and Psychology. In 2006 he was appointed as a Senior Research Fellow at the CN Centre for Occupational Health and Safety. Dr. Kelloway was the founding Ph.D. Program Director for the Saint Mary's Faculty of Commerce (2000 – 2003), the founding Director of the CN Centre for Occupational Health and Safety and a found-ing principal of the Centre for Leadership Excellence. In 2009 he was appointed as the Tier I Canada Research Chair in Occupational Health Psychology.

Dr. Kelloway is a prolific researcher having published over 200 articles, book chapters, and technical reports in addition to 14 authored/edited books. Active in several professional societies he is Past-Chair of the Canadian Society for Industrial/Organizational Psychology and in 2016 was President of the Canadian Psychological Association – Canada's national association for psychology. As a consultant, Dr. Kelloway maintains an active practice consulting to private and public sector organizations on issues related to leadership, occupational health psychology and human resource management.

Updates and Incorporation of Climate Resilience into the Atlantic Canada Water and Wastewater Design Guidelines. Danker Kolijn, Mike Chaulk and Mike Abbott, CBCL

ACWWA has recognized the effects of climate change on existing and future water and wastewater infrastructure, and in late 2018, secured funding to incorporate the consideration of climate resilient infrastructure into the updates of the existing "Water Supply Guidelines (2004)" and "Wastewater Guidelines (2006)". The presentation will provide background information on development of the project, outline the major components of the project, define climate resilient infrastructure, provide examples of global climate change events, and provide examples of recent climate related impacts on water and wastewater infrastructure in Atlantic Canada. The presentation will also discuss some of the proposed changes to both Guidelines based on the latest drafts.

CHARITY AUCTION

Members of the Maritimes Provinces Water & Wastewater Association (MPWWA) provide water and wastewater services to our communities every day to protect the public health and the environment. We strive to support our communities in any

way we can and this year we are proud to hold our 11th Annual Charity Auction in support of *Dreams Take Flight Halifax*.

Dreams Take Flight stretches children's minds. As poet Oliver Wendell Holmes once wrote, "One's mind, once stretched by a new idea, never regains its original dimensions."

In 1989, several Air Canada employees in Toronto planned a trip-of-a-lifetime. They held bake sales to raise the thousands needed. Many cupcakes, cookies and healthy ingredients later, they flew 70 special needs children on a DC-9 aircraft to Walt Disney World in Florida.

The trip changed the children's lives. For the first time, they understood that possibilities exist. Possibility without limitation.

By 1997, the Dreams Take Flight charity had expanded across Canada to eight cities: Vancouver, Edmonton, Calgary, Winnipeg, Ottawa, Toronto, Montreal and Halifax. The trajectory continues. Once a year, each chapter replicates the inaugural 1989 flight.

For a very long and exciting day, deserving children have an adventure in a world-renowned theme park in California or Florida. All expenses paid—thanks to sponsors and volunteers. These children aren't accustomed to mind-stretching ideas. They have challenges that might be medical, mental, physical, social or emotional. They understand the word, "no."

Air Canada donates planes. Volunteers raise money throughout the year. Donors give to cover all the expenses—aircraft fuel, park admission, spending money, plus cash for souvenirs and gifts. Each child and their escort are clad in signature clothing to set them apart in the park.

By the end of 2018, more than 35,000 children had known a trip-of-a-lifetime.

When they land back home, the idea of "yes," is in their thoughts. Their minds are stretched to new dimensions. They see new possibilities, and they have the memories to prove it for a lifetime.

Workshop A: Actuator Technologies and Control in Water/Wastewater

Driven by both environmental regulations and the need to have more efficient and reliable operations, actuator technology can play a key role in plant performance. In this presentation, we will identify the most common actuator technologies used in the Water/Wastewater industries, gain a better understanding of available technologies, and make more informed decisions when upgrading or retrofitting applications. Presenter: Bill Fox, Beck

Workshop B: Lagoons and Ammonia: Meeting Federal and Provincial Toxicity Requirements. Ammonia management is an increasing concern within the wastewater industry. In this presentation, we will explore the background, methodology, merits and suitable applications of two options – the submerged attached growth reactor (SAGR), and the moving bed biofilm reactor (MBBR). Presenter: Francis Bordeleau, Nexom

Workshop C: A Basic Overview of Ethernet Radio Communications for Integrated Control and Monitoring of Potable Water Distribution and Wastewater Collection Systems. The presentation will include the following topics: a brief explanation of radio waves and how they are generated, antennas, different types and where they are used, importance of good grounding and protective devices, frequencies commonly utilized by radio systems in municipal applications, licensed versus unlicensed frequencies, their pros and cons, how secure is a Radio Communications network? and an example of Ethernet Radio features using the GE MD Orbit Radio as an example. As well , there will be time for questions. Presenter: Marcel Belanger, Belanger Electric

Workshop D: Disinfection Discovered Amid Post-Lagoon Nitrification

This presentation will focus on the lagoon-based wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) in Doaktown, New Brunswick, where engineers chose to implement SAGR fully-aerated inground horizontal flow rock media beds for cold climate post-lagoon nitrification. The system has already proven at more than 70 full-scale installations, that it can reduce ammonia to <1 mg/L in water temperatures as low as <1°C. Presenter: Francis Bordeleau, Nexom

Workshop E: Sampling Strategies to Ensure Data Quality – How You Sample can Affect Your Results. Presenter: Joyce MacDonald, AGAT Labs

Workshop G: How air valves are critical to your piping network. Knowing the correct Air Valve to use in a piping network is critical to the stability and longevity of your piping network. We all know we need to control the air going in and out of the piping network to ensure the piping, pumps, and other equipment is protected but not everyone knows what type to select and where it needs to be located. Choosing the correct style of air valve for each application, sizing it correctly and knowing its limitations is critical. Presenter: Darren McMullen, Omnitech

Workshop H: Modern SCADA Reporting – New tools make data analytics and reporting easier for the average user. Increase your confidence in your reports, improve the impact of your presentations, and advance your team's effectiveness. Learn to use modern tools to easily export data from your SCADA history as well as to visualize and interrupt the data with Excel and other software products. Examples will include both ad-hoc and scheduled reporting templates designed to be created without the need to be a programmer. We will, however, introduce the benefit of more advanced data processing and where to learn more about it. Presenter: Dave Spencer, Trihedral

Workshop I: Nitrogen and Phosphorus Removal. This presentation will speak to innovative methods of nitrogen and phosphorus removal and the differentiators/ considerations between available technologies on the market. Specifically, we will outline key differentiators in attached-growth biological systems for ammonia and organics reductions, using the BioCord TM Reactor as an example to illustrate differences in CAPEX/OPEX, maintenance and energy requirements, customizability, footprint, and oxygen transfer capabilities, amongst other considerations for operators and municipalities. Workshop J: NSE Regulatory Updates. Updates to the Nova Scotia Guidelines for Monitoring Public Drinking Water Supplies. This presentation will review the recent changes to the Nova Scotia Guidelines for Monitoring Public Drinking Water Supplies and how those changes will impact approval holders in the province. Presenter: Krysta Montreuil, NSE

Workshop K: Emergency Response Plan (ERP) vs Emergency Action Plan (EAP). Does your organization have one and do you know the difference? This seminar will highlight the fire & life safety hazards specific to water and wastewater facilities and will discuss code compliant and industry best practices solutions to help your facility efficiently implement risk mitigation measures. Presenter: Blayne Buckler, CC Safety & Compliance Services .

Workshop L: Climate Change - Mitigating the Effects of Sewer Backups in the Basement. Recent projects focused on mitigation of the potential impacts of climate change on Canada's built environment have significantly raised the profile of I&I and basement flood risk within Canada's code and standards development agencies. The presentation will review recent projects commissioned by federal agencies, and upcoming activities associated with mobilizing resources. Mobilization will include work with multiple stakeholders to develop tools, including costing tools, websites, and other resources, targeted at specific technical and non-technical users of the above-mentioned resources.
